The inches of new snow that have just arrived are a cheerful reminder that Christmas is nearly upon us. It is a joy to try to surface from a year, which has mostly been happy but a times has seemed desperate, to wish you and your family a happy Christmas and all the best for the New Year.

The happiness was found in the family: the important event was young Timothy's christening in Düsseldorf. He is growing vigorously and he and his sister, Sarah, are the foci of Stephen and Conny's lives. In June our three families organised a weekend for everyone in Bamburgh in Northumberland to celebrate our fortieth wedding anniversary. It was apparently one of the few good weekends of the summer in those parts and full use was made of it in shovelling tons of sand to build castles against the incoming tide and in visiting Lindisfarne and the Farne Islands. The German Government went to some trouble to secure the secretariat a new home at a research institute in Munich so that we could continue to run it. While I formally changed my employer in January, the secretariat remained in Garmisch until the end of April to allow us to run the symposium, before physically moving to Munich. We then lived out of cardboard boxes for a couple of months before moving into a lavish, newly-renovated and furnished suite of offices on the south side of the city. In addition I acquired two new colleagues who have turned out to be very friendly and helpful.

Unfortunately, while everything has gone well, it has not been an easy time. My last months in Garmisch were clouded by lack of staff and an unhappy atmosphere which culminated, after an extremely successful symposium, in my former director threatening to sue me for the remarks he thought (wrongly) I made at the symposium dinner while making a presentation to my former secretary who had retired as a result of the changes. Happily the atmosphere in Munich is excellent but I soon discovered that it is a most incredible bureaucracy which, unfortunately, I am not patient enough to tolerate in a kindly way. The general situation, added to the 90 km each way commuting and the amount of work that Patricia has been doing, has taken a very real toll on both of us. But we had decided in May that, having set up the new office and got everything running, we would retire at the end of January and we can now hardly wait for the day to arrive! An excellent successor has been found so I have the extra pleasure of leaving everything in good hands.

So, are we coming home? Well we are staying on in Garmisch for a bit and will probably return to Newcastle in the Autumn. However this is not quite certain since it is very nice here and we now have a number of friends whom we are reluctant to abandon.

And what, we are often asked, are we actually planning to do in our retirement? The speculative answers are: sleep, or read, or write a book, or visit Pitcairn Island, or start a consulting business, or buy a boat, or surf the web, or build a model railway, or learn to cook (Peter), or re-start the Oslo embroidery, or explore the Italian hill towns or even visit all the friends to whom we send Christmas cards. We don't really know but a truthful answer we can give is: whatever we end up doing, what we are looking forward to most is the pleasure of be able to do just one thing at a time!

So provided we can get through the next month or so (a very real proviso), we are looking forward with some excitement to a complete change in our lives. Meanwhile we hope that we shall see you in the near future (this may be the last chance to visit us in Garmisch!) and once again, we offer you our hopes and best wishes for the future.
